Rewriting History: A Dialogue Between Yasmina Khadra's What the Day Owes the Night and Patrick Chamoiseau's Texaco

Abstract. This study offers a comparative analysis of historical rewriting in two major works of postcolonial Francophone literature: Yasmina Khadra's What the Day Owes the Night and Patrick Chamoiseau's *Texaco*. Through a theoretical approach combining insights from postcolonial studies contemporary historiography, the article examines the narrative strategies deployed by both authors to deconstruct hegemonic historical narratives and develop a new epistemology of historical facts. The analysis highlights the emergence of a specific memorial poetics which, through reinvented temporality and singular narrative corporeality, contributes to a fundamental reconstruction of the relationship between history and literature in the postcolonial Francophone space.
